Chairman's vote on SECY-14-0082: Jurisdiction for Military Radium and U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Oversight of U.S. Department of Defense Remediation of Radioactive Material

I approve the staff's recommendation to finalize and implement the key provisions of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the Department of Defense (DOD) for remediation of DOD sites containing radioactive materials subject the NRC's regulatory authority. As described by staff in SECY-14-0082, the MOU should be a written agreement that establishes a consultation process, exchange of information, and NRC involvement with DOD's remediation under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA) process. For awareness, staff should provide the Commission the Final Draft of the MOU before it is signed.

While I approve the staff's recommendation, I do have some concerns with the MOU approach. I am concerned with the staff's ability to address dispute resolution related to the MOU. Specifically, staff noted the possibility that challenging conflicts important to protection of public health and safety and the environment could arise between NRC and DOD that could not be resolved by the provision in the MOU for conflict resolution. Thus, I approve the staff's recommendation to periodically evaluate the effectiveness of the MOU, particularly for dispute resolution. Staff should report the outcome of this evaluation to the Commission on a biennial basis. If the MOU is found to be ineffective in resolving disputes, staff should recommend appropriate actions, including regulatory actions, to the Commission.

Furthermore, I approve including the regulatory costs associated with the MOU in the 10 percent of the NRC's budget that is not recovered through fees (i.e. off fee base and recovered through Congressional appropriations). As such, I approve development of a new fee relief category for the regulatory activities under the MOU. However, I note that I am concerned about the precedence that this establishes in terms of the budgetary burden to the NRC in the future. The determination as to whether the NRC should include sites in addition to those initially stipulated by the MOU should be handled on a case-by-case basis.

Lastly, I approve completion and publication of the Regulatory Information Summary (RIS), entitled 2011-XX, "NRC Regulation of Military Operational Radium-226." Staff should work with DOD while developing the planned "Radium [and other radiological materials] Implementation Plan" as requested by DOD in their submitted comments to the RIS. The timeline for developing this plan should coincide with the finalization of the Regulatory Information Summary associated with these activities.



I approve the staff's recommended course of action, to complete and execute a memorandum of understanding with the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) addressing the terms of NRC involvement with DoD remediation of radium and other Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended, material subject to NRC regulatory authorities. This approach is sound and reasonable given the complexities governing the interplay of statutory authorities between our two Federal agencies and impinging, also, on those of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Use of such memoranda, with a graded approach, is proven and, as the staff reports, "has been successful" at existing military sites undergoing remediation. I further approve the establishment of a new fee relief category for this activity. This is both necessary and appropriate. The staff should modify the draft Regulatory Issue Summary (RIS) consistent with the Commission's decision in this matter and publish the RIS in a *Federal Register* notice.

Commissioner Baran's Comments on SECY-14-0082

I approve the staff's recommended approach for NRC oversight of Department of Defense (DOD) remediation of radioactive material. As described in the SECY paper, the staff should complete the memorandum of understanding (MOU) with DOD, use the graded approach described in enclosure 6 to implement NRC's involvement under the MOU, establish a new fee relief category for the monitoring of DOD unlicensed sites, and complete the Regulatory Issue Summary. I agree with the staff that NRC's role in DOD remediation should be more robust in cases where EPA is not conducting oversight under CERCLA. The staff should provide the final draft of the MOU to the Commission for its information.

I share the concerns of Chairman Macfarlane and the staff regarding the effectiveness of dispute resolution under an MOU. However, I am satisfied that NRC has adequate enforcement options available if a dispute between DOD and NRC cannot be resolved through the MOU's dispute resolution process. Staff should periodically evaluate the effectiveness of the MOU, particularly with respect to dispute resolution, and report the results to the Commission on a biennial basis.

While reliance on the Memorandum of Understanding for NRC oversight of U.S. Department of Defense (DOD) remediation of radium at unlicensed sites may not be the most predictable way to implement our regulations, staff has proposed a workable approach given the circumstances. Staff's approach has been used successfully in the past with certain DOD activities and facilities. I approve the staff's recommended approach. Such an approach is only workable if the parties collaborate in good faith to ensure that remediation is carried out effectively and in conformance with the governing safety standards. Should this not be case, staff should provide the Commission with recommendations to implement a more formal licensing and oversight approach consistent with the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.
